Australia's First to Fall in the Great War



Able Seaman (AB) William George Vincent Williams, Official Number 294, Australian Naval and Military Expeditionary Force (AN&MEF). A member of the Ship's Company of HMAS Sydney. The first recorded Australian casualty of the First World War, AB Williams died on 11 September 1914 on HMAT Berrima, after receiving wounds from German sniper fire during the seizure of a German wireless station at Rabaul, New Britain. Born in Richmond, Victoria, on 24 November 1885, Williams was a Melbourne City Council employee prior to his enlistment in the AN&MEF.

The Australians had landed stealthily at Kabakaul in the early morning of 11th September 1914. Their mission was to capture the German Wireless Station at Bita Paka several miles south through the jungle of the Gazelle Peninsular in German New Guinea, now known as New Britain. Moving cautiously in tactical formation with rifles cocked, the Australians, a mix of Royal Australian Naval Reserve sailors and newly enlisted soldiers, followed the bush path deeper into the hills.

Suddenly gun fire rang out from well entrenched dug-outs on both sides of the track. The Australians dived for cover and returned fire. It was clear that the enemy outnumbered the Australians so messages were sent to the rear for reinforcements. In the meantime several men edged forward to get a better view of the enemy positions.



More firing broke out with the deadly menace of native sharp shooters hiding in coconut palms adding to the danger. Able Seaman William Williams from Northcote slumped to the ground mortally wounded in the stomach. Another sailor in the scouting party was Bill Kember. He was a 10 year veteran of the Royal Navy and rushed to Williams' assistance. Despite the continued fire from German and local native troops, Kember carried and dragged the wounded man nearly half a mile back to the aid post.

Once at the aid post the exhausted Kember gently laid his mate down and Captain Brian Pockley, the Sydney born Army medical officer, started to dress Williams' wound. Realising that early surgery was needed, Pockley instructed Kember and another sailor to take Williams back to the troopship for the necessary medical attention. Fearing an ambush en route Pockley courageously decided to give up his Red Cross brassard to Kember in the hope that the enemy would hold their fire in respect for the internationally recognized non combatant symbol.



With Kember wearing the brassard on his head, Williams was successfully removed to the rear and the advance continued. Shortly after, Pockley himself was hit by rifle fire whilst attending to another wounded man and had to be carried back to the ship's surgery. That afternoon, Williams succumbed to his wounds, followed soon after by Pockley. Both men were taken ashore and buried at Herbertshohe.

The existence of a state of war between Germany and Great Britain was known in Australia on 5th August 1914. Volunteering for an Army expeditionary force to be sent to Great Britain followed almost immediately.

Then four days later it was announced that a second force, destined for the tropics was also required. In a little over a week the best trained volunteers were selected for the latter force, and together with a contingent of about 500 Naval personnel, sailed from Sydney on the 'Berrima'. Their first taste of action was at Bita Paka.

The Tropical Force as it was termed was entirely successful in its mission. Seven months later the ANZAC heritage was immortalized on Gallipoli. It is seldom acknowledged however that the Tropical Force men, and some female nurses, achieved the first defeat of German forces, on German soil. There were even two Australian Flying Corps aircraft and crews dispatched to support the campaign. Further, the Australians had acted unilaterally under their own commanders for the first time in war, and had achieved a major strategic victory in the Pacific Ocean where the Germans possessed a powerful Naval force. Sadly, as a result of this early victory, Billy Williams, then Brian Pockley, became the first Australians to fall fighting the enemy in World War One.

Colin Shepherd OAM Memorial School Scholarships 2014

On Thursday evening 21st November, the St Marys RSL Sub-Branch conducted the annual Presentation Night for awarding the scholarships to Year 10 students who competed in this year's activity.

The Scholarship Program has been conducted annually for 12 years now and seems to be gaining increasing interest from eligible students each year. The eighteen scholarships on offer (for a total of \$30,000) attracted in the order of 100 entries across the six schools, these being Cambridge Park High, Colyton High Trade, Emmaus College, Erskine Park High, Gilgandra High and St Clair High. Scholarships are held by the student's school and monies spent under their control for educational purposes only.

Topics for students to choose from were all WW1 oriented and, in brief, included:

- Discuss with your parents/family to identify <u>a family member (e.g. Grandfather or</u> <u>Great Grandfather) who fought in the First World War (1914-1918)</u> then research that person's life.
- <u>Author a poem or design a visual display</u> that best reflects *your thoughts/feelings* about those in the Australian Defence Force who gave their lives so that all current and future Australians can live in the freedom, peace and harmony that we enjoy in this Nation today.
- Assume we are in Australia during the early days of the First World War. Our 'Mother' Country, Great Britain is asking for women to help in the war effort. Your task, on behalf of the Australian Government, is to <u>create a poster</u> that will motivate young women to volunteer, not only to help the 'Mother' Country, but also to undertake all the other tasks that women suddenly found were needed because the men-folk were going overseas as soldiers.
- <u>Australian Nurses</u> played an important part in the First World War (1914-1918) in caring for the wounded and supporting them back to health. Select and research one Australian Nurse from that period.
- Almost half a million Australians volunteered to join up during the First World War. Many heroic acts were performed by a great number of these. Select one such <u>Australian hero</u> from that period.
- During WW1 there were many great battles in France, Belgium and the Middle East. Select a region and <u>focus on one Battle</u> and *in your own words*, describe the importance of this Battle to the Australians, regardless of the outcome.

Saluting our Vietnam Veterans

A ceremony marking Vietnam Veterans Day was held at the St Mary's Veterans Outpost on Monday; a day in which we commemorate all those who gave their lives over the long and protracted conflict in South Vietnam.

The moving service included singing, the reciting of poems, wreath laying and a special 'dressing of the table' with the help of students from St Clair High School.

The table was dressed with items that represented some significance, for example lemon and salt - with lemon representing the bitterness that war brings and the salt representing the tears shed.



"Much emphasis has been placed on the dreadful battle of 'Long Tan' which took place in 1966, and we all now know the aftermath of that historic battle," said MC Burke Rogge.

"This however was not the last of the decisive battles which took place, with Australian troops being involved in the TET Offensive Battle of Bin Bah and FSB CORAL and BALMORAL.

"This day in August is now used to commemorate all who served in the bloody years of the Vietnam War. Naval personnel, RAAF and civilian workers who contributed to our goals of a free Republic of South Vietnam."

Forty eight years ago, the men of Delta Company, 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment withheld an enemy attack in a rubber plantation at Long Tan in Vietnam.

"Vastly outnumbered against their Viet Cong opponents, the Australians would lose 18 men in battle that day," Lindsay MP Fiona Scott said. "It was a defining battle in Australia's 10 year engagement in Vietnam."

"And its anniversary has become the day when a nation now acknowledges, with grateful thanks, those men who served their nation in the Vietnam War. "Thanks, it should always be acknowledged, that was far too long in coming," Miss Scott said.

Five hundred and twenty one Australians were killed in action in Vietnam. Three thousand were wounded in action and they returned home carrying the scars of the battle – both physical and emotional.

"Those who returned home were never properly honoured for their work serving their nation at their nation's request," Miss Scott said. "The physical and mental scars left by the war are still evident for many of those who served and their families."

Long overdue, the welcome home parade for Vietnam Veterans in 1987 saw the genesis for a Memorial in our nation's capital, a perpetual and ever-lasting reminder of the service and sacrifice of the almost 60,000 Australians who served in the Vietnam War.

The St Marys RSL Sub-Branch's ANZAC Centenary Committee kicked off in October and has already progressed the planning for a broad range of activities or events that will be prominent throughout 2015 and particularly during our 2015 ANZAC Commemorative Services. Please mark your 2015 calendar/diary for the ANZAC Sunday Service in Victoria Park on the afternoon of Sunday 19th April, as well as the special Dawn Service at its usual time and location.

One such activity which will come to a head on 19th April is a project that remembers 162 volunteers who went from St Marys to join the conflict in World War 1. We have named the project "*St Marys Served Australia in WW1*".

All of the 11 High Schools and 21 Primary Schools if the St Marys area (i.e. the old St Marys Council District) have enthusiastically taken up the project which will see a compendium dedicated to the memory of these young men and women who put their daily lives aside to contribute to the fight for our nation's freedom 100 years ago. It is hoped that many students at those schools will, as a result of their involvement in the project, gain a higher awareness of this important element of Australia's rich local military history.

We anticipate that many of the schools will take up our offer to participate in our annual ANZAC Sunday march along Queen Street to Victoria Park, where the Commemorative Service will occur.

NOVEMBER 2014 REPORT

A milestone reached in the delivery of the VVAA St Marys Outpost Education Program with 10 years of operation completed, involving 50,000 plus Secondary School students among other accomplishments.

Over the 10 years the Outpost Education Program has:

- -forged enduring links with over 80 schools, both government and non-government,
- -visited a growing number of primary schools seeking guest speakers for commemoration services,
 -supported several other ESO's with information and resources to establish educational programs,

-worked co-operatively with the Australian War Memorial while supporting school visit programs, -addressed a variety of community organisations on the topics covered by the program, and -expanded the area of operation to schools further afield than originally envisaged.

An overview of 2014 Outpost Education Program achievements, presentations and activities show the following:

- -A tally of 152 hours of program delivery across 50 schools involving 5,400 senior students. -Memorable outreach visits to Parkes, Gilgandra and Cooma High Schools.
- -Australian War Memorial visits accompanying a total of over 200 students from Monaro High and Loreto College Kirribilli.
- -Significant involvement with Galston High School and community for a wonderful Anzac Commemoration Service.
- -Provision of Anzac Service guest speakers to 19 schools.
- -Attendance at the National Vietnam Veterans Museum Conference focusing on SAS operations during the Vietnam War.
- -Visiting the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Walkway at Seymour to document information for school presentations.
- -Responding to an invitation to the VP Day service at the Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway. -Joining veterans at the National Vietnam Veterans Memorial for the VV Day service.
- -Attending the AWM Last Post Closing Ceremony on VV Day for Pte Douglas Salveron, KIA at the Battle of Long Tan.
- -Attending the AWM on VV Day for the presentation of the play "Vietnam Dusted Off" by Brett Hunt, son of Frankie Hunt, "I Was Only 19". (Meeting up with Frank Hunt after the show for a few beers was most enjoyable.)
- -Accompanying a team of students from Bede Polding College to Rouse Hill Shopping Centre on Legacy Badge Day.
- -Attending Remembrance Day Services at the AWM and laying a wreath for departed comrades during the Last Post Closing Ceremony.
- -All program management and delivery costs covered by school/college donations in appreciation of Outpost Education Programs leaving a surplus for 2014 of approximately \$7,000.00 to help support other Outpost Initiatives.

VETERANS HOME CARE



Veterans and war widows/widowers are reminded about the safety related home and garden maintenance service available under the Veterans' Home Care (VHC) program.

The focus of home and garden maintenance services is to assist in keeping the home safe and habitable by minimising environmental health and safety hazards that may impact on you in and around the home.

WHAT SERVICES ARE AVAILABLE?

Tasks may include a range of minor maintenance or repair tasks that could be done by a handyman, such as:

- replacing light bulbs and tap washers
- installing batteries in smoke/security alarms

gutter, window or fan cleaning • minor home maintenance (e.g. cupboard door adjustment)
pruning, grass cutting or weeding only where a safety hazard exists

- clearing of debris following natural disasters • collection and/or cutting of firewood in rural and remote areas

- or other tasks agreed between you and your service provider.

'One-off yard/garden clean ups covering a variety of tasks may only be approved in specific circumstances i.e. if you are assessed with mobility limitations.

WHAT SERVICES ARE NOT AVAILABLE?

The following tasks are not available:

- tasks that require a qualified tradesperson, such as a plumber, electrician etc

major home repairs and maintenance, such as gutter replacement, house painting, and garden tasks such as landscaping, mulching, branch lopping, tree felling, tree removal etc
tasks that are considered to be routine, cosmetic or ornamental gardening services such as weeding, maintaining flower beds, regular lawn mowing and pruning of shrubs, unless there is an environmental health or safety hazard.

In Flanders Field

by John McCrae, May 1915



Lt Alexis Helmer 1st Brigade Canadian Field Artillery

During the early days of the Second Battle of Ypres a young Canadian artillery officer, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer, was killed on 2nd May, 1915 in the gun positions near Ypres. An exploding German artillery shell landed near him. He was serving in the same Canadian artillery unit as a friend of his, the Canadian military doctor and artillery commander Major John McCrae.

As the brigade doctor, John McCrae was asked to conduct the burial service for Alexis because the chaplain had been called away somewhere else on duty that evening. It is believed that later that evening, after the burial, John began the draft for his now famous poem "In Flanders Fields".

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.
